(CINCINNATI, OH — February 2, 2018) — Cincinnati-based **FotoFocus**, the nonprofit arts organization that champions photography and lens-based art, is proud to announce the line-up and thematic focus for the **FotoFocus Biennial**, the largest of its kind in America.

"FotoFocus works year-round to support lens-based art, but we particularly look forward to the FotoFocus Biennial. Bringing the partnerships we've cultivated, across the region and the world, to our community is thrilling," says **Mary Ellen Goeke, FotoFocus Executive Director.**

The FotoFocus Biennial spans **70** museums and galleries across **Greater Cincinnati, Northern Kentucky, Dayton** and **Columbus, Ohio,** featuring over 200 artists, curators, and educators. Each Biennial is structured around a unifying theme; for 2018 that theme is **Open Archive**.

"This edition of the FotoFocus Biennial addresses an aspect of photography that has been central to the medium since its invention: its unruly abundance," says **Kevin Moore**, **FotoFocus Artistic Director.** "How do we organize and care for so much imagery? *Open Archive* explores the terrain, both old and new, of a classic photo topic."

FOTOFOCUS BIENNIAL PROGRAM

- Performance of "Blind Spot," a new interdisciplinary collaboration between writer and photographer Teju Cole and acclaimed composer and pianist Vijay lyer at Memorial Hall following the FotoFocus Biennial Symposium on October 6. - Conversation with filmmaker, artist, and writer Miranda July about her archive project

FOTOFOCUS BIENNIAL AT CONTEMPORARY ARTS CENTER

The 2018 FotoFocus Biennial is made possible through the collaborative efforts of hundreds of organizations. During the Biennial, for the first time, FotoFocus-curated exhibitions will be on view on all exhibition floors of the Contemporary Arts Center:
