

## These artists made the cut for FotoFocus' Carnegie exhibit

A Cincinnati nonprofit that champions the use of photography and lens-based art has selected 44 artists from an open call for inclusion in the group's exhibition beginning next month in Northern Kentucky.

<u>FotoFocus'</u> "AutoUpdate" examines technology's impact on photography and video. The works of 44 artists from Ohio, Kentucky and Indiana will be on view Sept. 14-Nov. 16 at the Carnegie, 1028 Scott Blvd., in Covington. A

reception will be held 5-8 p.m. Oct. 4 with a special performance by artist <u>Maggie Lawson</u> at 7 p.m. The juried group show exhibition accompanies the organization's <u>symposium</u>, which features <u>Trevor Paglen</u>, <u>Lynn Hershman</u> <u>Leeson</u>, <u>Nancy Burson</u>, <u>Josh Kline</u> and others.

The 44 artists were selected by a jury of regional organization and institution leaders, including <u>Carissa Barnard</u>, FotoFocus; <u>Matt Distel</u>, the Carnegie; <u>Alice Gray Stites</u>, 21c Museum Hotels; <u>Jo-ey Tang</u>, Beeler Gallery, Columbus College of Art and Design, and <u>Michael Vetter</u>, Newfields art museum, Indianapolis.

"Our bi-annual symposium is renowned for bringing internationally celebrated artists and speakers like <u>Trevor Paglen</u> to the Cincinnati region. This year, we're pleased to introduce a parallel exhibition for local and regional artists, showing our commitment to engaging with the community and creating new opportunities for local artists," <u>Mary Ellen Goeke</u>, FotoFocus executive director, said in a release.
